"Knowing them, they'd decide to raise all the highways."


AN OLD IRISHMAN was coming home late one night from the pub. As he passed the graveyard, he thought of all his friends there, and then spotted a stone by the road.

"The poor man," he thought, "buried out here by the highway. And he lived to the ripe old age of 145. Here's to you, Miles from Dublin."


