SCAMS

It seems that more and more scams are creeping up in email, phone calls and on Facebook. if you are wondering if it is legitimate:

IF THE CALLER...

- asks you to wire money or buy a prepaid card;
- says you have won a prize or a gift but you need to pay fees or taxes first;
- asks you to visit websites or download software;
- asks for usernames, passwords, account numbers, or your home address;
- says the offer is only good for today; or
- asks you to keep the call a secret, JUST HANG UP!




For emails:

1. Look at the sender's address. If it is a private address and does not contain any information related to the email, it is not legitimate. For example, a email that has a logo that looks like your bank, suggests your account may have been hacked. Look at the sender's address above the main message. It will be above your email address. If it looks like a private email address and does not have the company's name in it, it is most likely from a scammer. The sender address will be in between the < and > signs. In the case below, the sender address is <admin@vigaro.com>

- 2. Urgent or threatening emails are also often clear indicators of a fake message. Such as the previous example from Chase. By creating a sense of urgency or fear, they'll trick you into clicking on a link or downloading a suspicious attachment. Don't click on it. Delete the email instead.
- 3. Check for spelling errors and incorrect grammar. If an email contains multiple spelling mistakes or poor grammar, it's likely from a bot rather than a real person.
- 4. An offer too good to be true. For example, you get an email that says you qualify to receive a prize from a company in Texas. You've never been to Texas and haven't entered any contests.
- 5. Missed package delivery. I actually received one of these during Christmas. It was from the US Postal Service and said they had tried to deliver a package but missed me. I was expecting a package that had to be signed for. It said I could schedule a Redelivery Date by clicking on the link below and filling out form PS 3849. I had never heard of having to do this. I looked at the return address and sure enough, it was from USPostalSystem < 7asw76tem@efliorbitz.yahoo.com> A few days later, I HAD missed a delivery, but the post office left a little yellow slip, the kind I was used to, with the redelivery date.

Facebook scams:

- 1. You receive a new message that you must verify your account by clicking on a link. This is not how they verify your account. Don't click on the link.
- 2. Before ordering anything from Facebook, check the Better Business Bureau and look up their company online.
